EDUCATION	73% favor making college affordable. 83% oppose cuts to K-12 education.	Increases funding for Pell Grants for college students. Expands funding for pre-K education. CORPORATE TAXES	64% favor higher corporate taxes. 73% oppose no taxation on overseas profits.	Proposes lowering corporate taxes and closing tax loopholes.	Reduces corporate tax rate from 35% to 25%; releases overseas profits from taxation.	Prevents corporations from avoiding taxation through overseas profits.	Creates a "Wall Street Sales Tax" on corporate financial transactions.
INDIVIDUAL TAXES	70% want a simpler tax code with lower rates. 66% want higher rates for the wealthy.	Limits deductions for top 2% of earners. Imposes minimum tax rate on millionaires.	Lowers tax rates for wealthiest taxpayers by creating just two tax brackets of 10% and 25%.	Limits deductions for the top 2% of earners.	Ends tax cuts for top 2%; raises taxes on millionaires; ends low tax rates on investment income.
WAR FUNDING	60% favor removing troops from Afghanistan as soon as possible.	Does not specify.	Reduces funding to \$47 billion in 2014, then maintains funding at \$37 billion for 10 years.	Provides \$100 billion for 2013, then reduces to \$50 billion in 2014 and \$25 billion in 2015.	Ends war funding in 2015.
MILITARY FUNDING	58% want major reductions in military spending	Cuts Dept. of Defense funding by 1.6% to \$526.6 billion in 2014.	Prevents sequestration cuts to the military budget.	Reduces military spending by \$240 billion over 10 years.	Reduces military spending by \$897 billion over 10 years.
MEDICAID	52% support the expansion of Medicaid. 46% oppose any cuts to Medicaid.	No proposed changes. Maintains program expansion under Obamacare.
